Spending too much time on social media?

Do they have hundreds of social media followers?

Are their online actions affecting others?

Most social media apps have a minimum age rating of 13.

If a social network has set an age limit, it means that some of the content may not be suitable for a younger child. We strongly advise you to follow the minimum age rating. If you do say yes, use strict privacy settings and either 'friend' your child or ask a family member to. In addition, ensure your children use their devices to go online in common areas such as living rooms. It's far easier to keep any eye on what they are up to here than if they are in their bedroom!

'Top 10 Tips' to share with your child...

- Don't post any personal information online like your address, email address or mobile number.
- Think carefully before posting pictures or videos of yourself. Once you've put a picture online most people can see it and
 may be able to download it. It's not just yours anymore.
- Keep your privacy settings as high as possible.
- Never give out your passwords.
- Don't befriend people you don't know.
- Don't meet up with people you've met online. Speak to your parent or carer about people suggesting you do.
- Remember that not everyone online is who they say they are.
- Think carefully about what you say before you post something online.
- Respect other people's views.
- If you see something online that makes you feel uncomfortable, unsafe or worried, leave the website and tell a trusted adult immediately.
