The NSPCC's Speak Out. Stay Safe. programme is visiting our school to make sure our pupils have the knowledge and understanding they need to stay safe from

abuse. I'm pleased to tell you that we will be working with the NSPCC, the UK's leading children's charity, who'll be delivering their **Speak out. Stay safe** programme on **Tuesday, 21**st **June.** This is a nationwide programme for every primary-school-aged child in the UK and Channel Islands. With the help of their friendly mascot Buddy, they'll be presenting an assembly and workshop to the children in our school.

What is the *Speak out. Stay safe*. programme? Through child-friendly, interactive assemblies and workshops their specially trained staff and volunteers will give our children information about how to keep themselves safe from harm and how to get help if they have any worries, sensitively discussing issues like bullying and sexual abuse ('privates are private' for the KS1 assembly), without using scary words or adult language.

We have studied the content of the materials and heard from other schools who have participated and are

extremely confident that they are appropriate for primary-school-aged children. By the end of their visit, we're

convinced children will feel empowered – knowing how they can speak out and stay safe.

<u>Parent Forum</u> - Thank you to the parents who attended the half termly Parent Forum this week. Below is a summary of our discussions:

Engaging parents in the life and work of the school—a long discussion took place about how the school and trust might get more parents involved in the life and work of the school. The idea of workshops for parents on helping their child with school work was discussed. Mr Lees said that from September 2016, Mrs Tamsin Parry will be the school's Parent Support Adviser (PSA) and she will be thinking of creative ways to include parents in the life and work of the school. She will also be available to support parents if needed.

The teaching of maths—parents would welcome some support in the teaching of maths and in particular new calculation methods as these have changed considerably since many parents were at school. Mr Gynn said he would discuss this with the school's math's coordinators.

Spelling Karate—Parents asked if this approach to spelling was still being used as in some classes it appeared not to be. Mr Gynn said he would look into whether this approach was still being used and discuss the consistent use of this in all classes.

Classes and teachers teaching them from September 2016—Parents enquired into when the classes for September 2016 would be announced. Mr Lees said that the school was still recruiting teaching assistants for the classes and when this was complete, classes would be organised and parents informed later in the term.

Pathway by the side of the school—parents wondered who was responsible for keeping this pathway free of weeds, nettles and low hanging branches. Mr Gynn said that we were not sure but he would ask Ralph the school caretaker to have a look and to cut back any overgrown areas.

Swimming lessons—a parent wondered whether swimming could start earlier in the children's school life. Mr Gynn explained that school had now focused swimming on Year 3 and above and when the children go swimming they are in the water for one hour. Other parents at the meeting agreed that this was good value and the children made good progress with swimming when it started in Year 3.

School Uniform—parents asked if there could be a sale of old school uniform. After a discussion, it was agreed that parents would be asked to donate old school uniform that was still fit for purpose. This would be offered to all parents on Friday 1st July at 3.15pm alongside the PFTA ice cream sale. Parents would be asked to make a small donation for items taken and this would be used by the PTFA to purchase some more sports kits for the school's swimming team.

After school clubs—some parents are still concerned at the after school clubs booking arrangements and whether this was fair and equitable. Mrs Carmichael has added that everyone who requested a place on a club got one (some for only 1st or 2nd half of the term if over-subscribed). Nobody was refused a club place this term.
